
Sometimes it seems God is everywhere but where you need him to be. When life seems so ordinary, so mundane, it is easy to

Suggested Interview Questions For Nathan Thebridge, author of *Life Interrupted Revealing the Fingerprints of God*

Q: Tell us a little about yourself and your background.

A: I'm a sunburnt Aussie kid who grew up in the suburbs of south-western Sydney. I come from a middle-class family and enjoyed a well-balanced upbringing. I'm grateful to say that my most vivid memories growing up outside of family is church on Sundays. Not far from our home still stands today a church on a hill, a beautiful place of hardwood floors and chipped walls that echo the life songs of some precious saints. Strong memories live there, hiding within the timber work and stained pews that line the sanctuary—under that weathered steeple lies a lifetime of memories. Today, church is still a significant part of who I am.

Q: You've been involved in ministry and leadership for some time. How does this add to who you are?

A: One of the greatest things a Christian can do is find a local church and pour their heart and soul into it. I believe they'll never be the same again. God built within our humanity the need for relationship, the desire to belong. That's most adequately fed when we do life with a community of faith that builds and strengthens our journey. So, my connection to a community of faith or church is central to my personal narrative.

Q: This is your first book. How did it come about?

A: I started to develop a real joy for writing with the *Chasing Light* blog. I had preached a message on navigating pain and used the story of Simon of Cyrene as my context—to be completely truthful it wasn't one of my best messages. Nonetheless I started to blog on it while at the kitchen table. I remember my wife Norma was in the kitchen; we were talking, catching up, and I was caught in a moment. My writing extended beyond a normal blog and at some point I felt I had



a reasonable outline for a book. I keep my blogs pretty short and so I knew I had something. The rest, as they say, is history.

Q: Tell us about your blog, *Chasing Light*.

A: Chasing Light started out as an opportunity to connect to the younger generation in our home church. I started what essentially evolved into a weekly devotional or blog that was designed to find God in our everyday ordinary lives. It's so easy to get lost in our busy, caught in our schedule that we forget to connect with heaven and so *Chasing Light* became that medium to promote a regular connection with our team.

Q: Simon of Cyrene's story is largely unknown. How did you manage to write a book based on him?

A: Since my youth I had always been fascinated with this narrative. Just a couple of verses that build a context for arguably one of the most amazing encounters and stories of human history. Of course, *Life Interrupted* starts with this unknown innocuous guest of Jerusalem, but there's always more to the story. We, like so many Bible characters, see God do amazing things beyond any reason or planning in our lives. Often it's a mystery to us until time passes and God's secrets are revealed. Simon's story is no different; what's amazing is more than two thousand years on we read his story as we stand in awe and we wonder, *what can God do with me*?

Q: *Life Interrupted* explores pain and the challenges we face along the way. What does this pain say about God?

A: That's a good question! I like to look for what I call "the fingerprints of God"—as we journey through pain and the challenges that life can bring, I think we often miss the signs along the way that show God in the middle of our mess. Scripture declares in Psalms 34:18 that "God is close to the brokenhearted." We can often miss this in the midst of tragedy. We know from Romans 8:28 that "in all things God works for the good of those who love Him." So God is not only interested in our pain; He desires to heal it and work "good" in it.



Q: What would you say to someone who is in the midst of a storm and struggling to navigate their way through?

A: We are called to "bear one another's burdens"—the message gives way to a significant thought: you are not alone! In my reach for God I want to be available for His people. I'm here today because of the grace and favor extended to me through friends and family. So I would say to someone who is the midst of a trial: don't stand alone. I would remind them of the tremendous love and affection that our Heavenly Father has for them, and that He is not detached from your hurt and cares about your heart.

Q: So, you've launched your first book; any plans for a second?

A: I would love the opportunity to continue to write and explore future books. I think we've stored enough blogs to consider a weekly devotional for *Chasing Light*. I would love to pursue other opportunities as they arise.
