

There is a growing revival of Jewish Christians—the Messianic Jewish movement—and a parallel movement—the "Jewish roots movement." As a result, an ancient





Suggested Interview Questions For Ariel Laurence Blumenthal, author of One New Man

Reconciling Jew & Gentile in One Body of Christ

Q: What first led you to research, teach, and write on this subject of *One New Man*?

A: One New Man focuses on the reconciliation of Jew & Gentile through the cross. It's funny, that even though I'm Jewish and have been part of the Messianic Jewish movement for over 20 years, I didn't come to the One New Man primarily through this lens. I actually first started to think about it and search the Scriptures as a result of an intercessory prayer movement among Japanese & Korean Christians! I was serving as a missionary in Japan at the time, and was invited to participate in this movement of reconciliation and repentance for historic sins between these two nations. I saw the Holy Spirit work very powerfully through these meetings, and this drew me towards looking into how the Gospel functions in this way among people groups—between Israel & the nations, and then between all the nations and people groups.

Q: What is this "One New Man" really about?

A: First, the phrase comes from the teaching of Paul in the 2nd and 3rd chapter of his letter to the Ephesians. He is describing how the cross and the Gospel message serve to bring reconciliation, peace, and a new kind of harmonious relationship among people groups—first between Jew & Gentile, and then by extension to all people groups. It is the gospel message for a world in conflict—wherever there has been sin, hatred, and racism between different tribes, nations, and racial groups.



Q: Your book talks a lot about the Torah, the Laws of Moses, Foods, etc. If this is just about reconciliation between Jew & Gentile in Christ, why all of this stuff?

A: Good question! I also was surprised when I began to research and teach on the subject to find these things so central to Paul's teaching of the One New Man in Ephesians 2:14-16. For two individuals from disparate backgrounds to find peace and unity in Christ may be a challenge; but the bigger problem arises when we try to find this peace and unity on a larger scale—between nations, between churches, denominations, traditions, etc. Now we have a lot of baggage to deal with—historical pride and sin, traditions, culture, theologies, philosophies, national "myths" and the like. And, it turns out, it can be really hard for us as communities to "drop" this baggage in the name of reconciliation and unity with those who are different, or with those whom we have been in conflict with. The One New Man message is a kind of template, of how first we as Jews have to lay down our Torah-based culture of foods and festivals in order to birth true unity in Christ. The mystery of the One New Man is how these Mosaic commandments may still function as part of our Jewish identity, but no longer in a way that makes our culture and practice somehow superior, or more "holy" than that of other ethnic groups in the Body of Christ.

Q: What does all this theological stuff mean for you in real life? Where does the "rubber hit the pavement" for you with this One New Man?

A: Well, we are Jewish believers in Christ who live in downtown Jerusalem, Israel. It is an honor and privilege for us to participate in the amazing, miraculous restoration of our nation according to Biblical prophecy. There is great strength and blessing for us in our identity as Jews at this time in history. Our people and our nation are an ongoing testimony to the faithfulness of God and His word! The One New Man means that we are constantly thinking and praying about how we can share these blessings with our Christian brothers and sisters from among the nations. And, this starts for us at home in the Middle East, among Jew & Arab. Both as a family and as a ministry, we are focused on building bridges, on real relationships and partnerships with our Arab Christian brothers and sisters—here



in Israel, Palestine, Jordan, Egypt, and throughout the Middle East. And, for us as a family, this also extends to the churches of East Asia—Japan, China, Korea, Thailand, etc. Through the One New Man understanding, God has given us a great heart to see revival, growth, and breakthrough for the church in all of these places.

Q: What's it like being a Messianic Jew, a tiny minority in Israel?

A: Thank God, we're not as tiny as we used to be! There are about 15,000 Messianic Jewish Israelis, in some 120 congregations. In addition, there is a similar number of Arab Christians and international Christians living in Israel. The Body of Christ here is very dynamic and growing all the time. Yes, we face a fair deal of pressure from the society, sometimes all out harassment, but the heart of the average "man on the street" is far more open to the Gospel than it used to be.

Q: What do you think is the main message of One New Man to Christians in the USA?

A: The US is an interesting and unique place for a few reasons. First, it is not a homogenous, "tribal" nation—like most around the globe—but instead a giant melting pot for all races and ethnicities, a place where all are supposed to "blend in" and get along. But as events over the last few years have proven, the whole ethnic/racial question—especially between whites and blacks—is something that we just can't seem to shake in America. Historical sin and tension between people groups doesn't just "go away" with time. I think *One New Man* can help American Christians think about the Biblical reality of tribe and ethnicity—what it looks like, and how it is supposed to function; how God intends it to be something that can both be celebrated and also a great blessing to the "other"—only if we have the mind and heart of Christ.

Second, America is a unique place because of the presences of such a large number of Jews—second only to Israel. This means that the One New Man template of reconciliation and unity between Jew & Gentile can be lived out here in a very profound way. On the other hand, as I point out in my book, there can be



many pitfalls, things which have led to a lot of identity confusion among American Christians who have drawn close to the Messianic Jewish movement. Here, the role of the Israeli body is key.

Q: The message of One New Man seems to have something to do with unity among Christians...is this true? How can this book contribute to such unity?

A: Yes, the message of racial and ethnic reconciliation in Christ is obviously a key to unity in the church. Over 15 years of teaching this material, I've witnessed the Holy Spirit heal divisions among different nationalities, churches, and church movements. Also, as Messianic Jews in Israel our desire is to serve the church worldwide as an agent of unity. We believe all of this is preparation for His return!
