
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A GRADUAL REDEMPTION

Suggested Interview Questions For Kelly A. Williams, author of *A Gradual Redemption*

Q: What was the biggest inspiration or motivation behind writing this book?

A: The biggest inspiration or motivation behind writing the book was to tell my own story of redemption from beginning to end. Oftentimes we get ensnared by a moment in time or a particular circumstance, so to illuminate the process of redemption that can come through processing was one of my end goals.

Q: What presented the biggest challenge in conveying your story?

A: The biggest challenge that presented itself to me was to write about certain people from a position of honor rather than blame or judgment. Part of my own healing process came through the writing of this book and learning that there were still places in my heart where I held offense rather than forgiveness. Therefore, when I sensed the Lord tell me to write in such a way that if/when other parties referenced in my story should pick up the book, he or she would find Him.

Q: What, if anything, would you do differently?

A: Writing is always ongoing, and I don't know that there's anyone who writes for a living that doesn't reflect on their work and think, "Oh, I wish I had said that or written it that way." So of course, there are changes I would make but like all forms of self-expression, writing is evolutionary, and we have to accept what we produce for what it is the moment we produce it, not for the product we would have produced years later.



Q: What part was the most difficult part of your story to write about?

A: The most difficult part to recapture in my story was leaving Ohio for the final time knowing I would never permanently return. The relationships I had there represented and filled my deep sense of belonging, so being permanently transplanted to Indiana remained deeply hurtful years later when I had to revisit that moment all over again.

Q: What, if anything, changed for you once you completed the final manuscript?

A: I think the biggest change I realized was when I made the final edits and could breathe knowing I was finished with that portion of my story. I was able to breathe deeper than ever before. I was no longer being held captive by all that had happened. The discovery of redemption that occurred or was cemented in the writing process gave me a freedom I had never known previously.

Q: A Gradual Redemption covers quite a span of time, what was the process of keeping it as concise as you did?

A: A Gradual Redemption is heavily story-based, unlike the other two in the series, and yes it spans about 25 years. Some of its construction revolved around isolating the major factors of influence and going from there. My family's past was crucial and had to be presented contextually so that readers could understand how gaping of a hole losing my father really was and how that loss unknowingly impacted so many of my choices. His death and the ongoing sense of abandonment became two major navigational tools in the development of the story that helped hold it all together.

Q: What influenced you to end the book the way you did?

A: When I first stepped away from teaching to write, I kept getting the sense that there would be more than one book and even though I knew the crux of the first



book would be the redemption of a crisis pregnancy, I equally knew there was so much more to my story. Therefore, just as I wasn't initially sure where to start, I also wasn't sure where the story would end. So, with a fair amount of story mapping and prayer, I discovered that each part of my life had a segue into the next, therefore natural lines of demarcations occurred. For example, *A Gradual Redemption* begins with the loss of my father but ends with purchasing our home in such a miraculous way that only the goodness of our heavenly Father could have given. Each are life-changing moments that help set a person's trajectory.
